LACLJ Expands Protections for Immigrant Survivors

We are excited to share Governor Newsom recently signed into law AB 2169, which protects immigrant survivors from adverse immigration consequences due to legally invalid arrests and convictions on their records.

Over the past 5 years, California law advanced the rights of survivors through vacatur, a legal process to allow survivors to clear the criminal histories they incurred due to abuse and/or exploitation.

However, the law was not clear about its effect in immigration court or by USCIS.

As a result, immigrant survivors could still have their arrests and convictions used against them. This uncertainty left survivors vulnerable to deportation and at risk of not obtaining lawful status and the life-changing stability that comes with it.

LACLJ collaborated with the Sunita Jain Anti-Trafficking Initiative at Loyola Law School, Immigrant Legal Resource Center, and Free to Thrive to clarify the law. AB 2169 provides the same full set of protections for undocumented and noncitizen survivors as we have for citizen survivors. Now, all California immigrant survivors have full protection under our vacatur laws.

Most importantly, it provides immigrant victims of human trafficking, domestic violence and sexual assault with a more secure journey to remain safely in the U.S., obtain lawful status, keep their families together (reducing further trauma), and build more stable, hopeful futures.
